Acquisitions clerk Karen Doucet has long dreamed of working at a book store or a library.

"All of the women in my family are or were avid readers," she says. "I remember swapping bags of books with my grandmother, aunts, and mom because new books were too expensive to buy. My love of books of all kinds is very deeply rooted."

Doucet brings a background in retail management and customer service which she put to good use during her time as a library clerk at the Yarmouth library.

It was her desire for change that brought her to the library. After leaving her retail management position, she was intent on taking a year off from work, but a reserve library clerk position opened up at the Yarmouth library.

"I applied and was hired – much to my excitement!" She says.

Working at the library allows her to be immersed in books and new materials.

"It is like Christmas every day when I receive a box of new materials – I can't wait to get inside to discover the hidden treasures that await."

Her favourite memory of working at the library came when Regional Library Director Erin Comeau offered her the position of acquisitions clerk, allowing her to become a full-time employee and a part of the headquarters team.

Starting on Canada Day, the summer people return to play along in the surf, spend time with family and enjoy the company of friends and neighbours. Mixed in with this group and locals is a wide range of talent and interests.

The library is one of the venues during the annual Harmony Bazaar Festival of Women and Song. The festival began as a project of the Shelburne County Womens' Fishnet and has grown into a weekend of activities including youth stages, workshops, industry dinners, art galas, theatre performances and mentorships.

Gardeners use the property behind the library to grow summer produce and harvest seeds for the library's seed exchange

program.

In the fall, Write On writers group is in full swing. Their enthusiasm and appreciation for the arts was on display in October when a full house of 24 adults came to listen to gifted poets Janet Barkhouse, Frances Boyle and E. Alex Pierce read from their latest works. The poets Janet Barkhouse and Frances Boyle were partially funded through the League of Canadian Poets, and local writer and poet E. Alex Pierce provided the visiting pair with accommodations.

The poets shared their work with an audience who could not only hear their words, but could envision the places and experiences they evoked. Pierce, Barkhouse and Boyle appreciated the audience and commented on how "stellar" the experience was for them.

"It is with great professional pride that the library can serve as a venue to engage this community and help its arts thrive," says Western Counties Regional Library Deputy director Joanne Head.

# Library to celebrate 50 years
