New French Services Manager Doris Ponce brings both an and educator's multicultural background to the library. Born in Chile, Doris moved to Montreal in 1975. In 2000, she and her husband and family moved to Clare where she received her Bachelor in Education from Université Ste-Anne. She speaks Spanish, French and English.

"I have always worked in education and communications," she says. She has worked in the area of family literacy for the Conseil scolaire acadien provincial (CSAP), Équipe d'alphabétisation de la Nouvelle-Écosse, Le Courrier de la Nouvelle-Écosse, the Tri-County Regional School Board and Montreal's Commission scolaire Marguerite-Bourgeoys.

"Education is not just something that happens in the classroom," she says, adding she was inspired to apply for the position after reading the library's statement of values that encouraged lifelong learning.

"I think I can bring my experience and knowledge in education and literacy programs for children and adults to library services," she says. She believes she will be able to tap into her teaching network in the Tri-Counties to develop programming and partnerships.

"Books are important. Education is important," she says.

She believes the biggest challenge facing the library is to get more people into the library, especially certain branches.

She also believes she and her new co-workers can meet that challenge.

"If you believe in what you are doing, it's possible."

Knitting group a perfect library partner

In celebration of Canada's 150th birthday, Mona Foged has knit 150 colourful, lifesaving pneumonia vests. The vests save young lives in developing countries around the globe and were on display at McKay Memorial Library in Shelburne and Lillian Benham Library in Lockeport.

Inspired by fellow knitter Sandie MacKenzie, Foged, a member of the Shelburne library knitting group, completed the vests that are designed to help fight and reduce respiratory illnesses in children.

"I started knitting them in February," Foged says.

All of the yarn for the project was donated by members of the Shelburne library knitting group and the community, Foged says. She says it takes 2.5 to four hours to complete a vest, depending on the pattern and the person doing the knitting.

The group is a perfect example of a librarycommunity partnership says Western Counties Regional Library Deputy Director Joanne Head.

"It is a perfect partnership because it is grassroots," she says. "It started as a program and grew from there."

You don't need a library card to join the knitting group or to contribute to the cause, adds Shelburne library clerk Suzanne Grear.

She believes partnerships with organizations such as the knitting group are very important.

"They've done beautiful displays for us," she says, adding that they are open to everyone.

Foged says the group continues to thrive because of its partnership with the library.

She says the library is the ideal meeting place with its open environment, wonderful surroundings, daytime availability, access to materials, and no fee for the space used by the group.

"It's very welcoming," Foged says.

In return, the group takes a voluntary collection at each meeting and has bought items for the library, including a laptop, paper shredder, Blu-ray player and cooling fans.

"The knitting group is terrific," says Head. "It's been a win-win."
