Shelburne library expansion complete

New community room adds valuable venue to area

Shelburne's McKay Memorial Library expansion is completed, and the use of its new meeting rooms is growing rapidly.

"They are filling up," says Western Counties Regional Library Deputy director Joanne Head. "Word is out in the community and we have many new groups booking the room."

There are an increasing number of non-profit groups hosting workshops at the venue, she says.

Existing groups such as the knitting group, adult learning group, and book club still make use of the room, but others such as a health services group, 4-H group, and gardening club are taking advantage of the new facility.

While the library continues to offer its regular programming and events, the community room operates independently from library hours. Users can book the room and use it according to their timetable.

"The community has really embraced our new look," says senior library clerk Suzanne Grear. "They want to have their meetings in the new community room." The former program room has been expanded and updated. It has a kitchenette which includes a sink, refrigerator, microwave and coffee maker, donated by the Friends of the Library. There is a new track system to display the work of local artists and touring exhibits. The local knitting group donated a new laptop and Blu-Ray player for use in the room. The room now includes a ceiling mounted projector and drop-down screen.

"I think the new renovations are beautiful," says Grear. "The community room with the kitchenette and new windows and furniture looks so inviting for meetings."

The former reference room has been updated and modified to accommodate meetings. It can be closed off for privacy and has new windows. It also has a projector and screen for presentations and other uses.

"The new meeting room (former reference room) for open hour meetings is used a lot by tutoring and other groups when the community room is busy," Grear says.

The library has been renovated to include space for one-on-one meetings and reading. There have been public computer upgrades, and charging stations for electronics have been added.

Staff is in the process of reconfiguring the library shelving to fit into the updated design of the renovated facility, and the clerks kept focused throughout the expansion.

"We mostly just went with the flow and didn't stress over what our next task would be to prepare for the next day," Grear says of working through the seven-

month project. "We knew each step would bring us that much closer to the finished product. We were excited to see the new projects being finished. The carpenters were great always trying to work around some of our important events."

on July 27, 2016, work began in September and was completed in March.

The library received an \$85,487 grant through the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA) Innovative Communities Fund. The Municipality of the District of Shelburne and the Town of Shelburne each contributed \$10,000. The Shelburne Library Building Association fundraised \$50,000.

At the funding announcement Bob Legere, chair of the Shelburne Building Association, said, "We are grateful to all the donors, funders and everyone who

helped transform this idea into a reality."

The renovation and expansion comes at a time of growth for the Town of Shelburne. The Canada 2016 Census showed an increase in the town's population of 3.4 per cent over 2011 as the population grew from 1,686 residents to 1,743.
